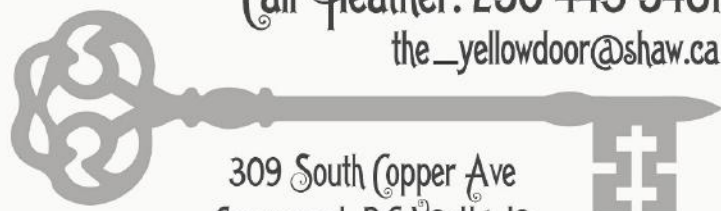

RDKB Ignites FireSmart Savings with New Rebate Program

The Regional District of Kootenay Boundary (RDKB) has announced the launch of its Residential FireSmart Rebate Program, providing an incredible opportunity for residents to enhance the wildfire resiliency of their homes and communities. This initiative is the latest addition to the RDKB's ongoing efforts to promote FireSmart practices, reinforcing the district's commitment to wildfire mitigation.

Homeowners who have taken advantage of a FREE FireSmart Home Assessment by an RDKB Wildfire Mitigation Specialist—and those planning to do so in the future—are now eligible to apply for rebates ranging from \$500 to \$5,000. This rebate is designed as a 50% cost-share, meaning that for every dollar spent on eligible FireSmart activities, homeowners can receive 50 cents back, up to the program's maximum.

"This is another great step forward for the RDKB's FireSmart program," said Carlene Pires, RDKB's Emergency Program/FireSmart Coordinator. "We're proud to support residents who are proactively taking measures to protect their homes and communities. This rebate program recognizes and rewards their efforts, helping to offset the costs of important mitigation work."

Key Details of the FireSmart Rebate Program:

Rebate Amounts: Homeowners can apply for rebates between \$500 and \$5,000, with the rebate amount calculated as 50% of the total cost of eligible mitigation work. For instance, \$1,000 of completed work qualifies for a \$500 rebate, while \$10,000 or more in work is needed for the full \$5,000 rebate.

Eligible Work: To qualify for the rebate, residents must complete the mitigation actions specified in the FireSmart assessment report provided by an RDKB Wildfire Mitigation Specialist. Only work done within 30 meters of the home is eligible.

Application Process: Residents must document their work using the Rebate Application Form, tracking both personal labour (valued at \$32.00/hour) and any hired contractors or materials. Completed applications, including photos and receipts, should be submitted to firesmart@rdkb.com.

Timeline: Applications are open from August 15th to October 31st, 2024. For those who cannot complete their work within this period, the rebate program will reopen with an earlier intake in Spring 2025, ensuring that future application windows allow ample time for participation.

The FireSmart Rebate Program is available to residents in RDKB's Electoral Areas A, B, C, D, and E, as well as the municipalities of Fruitvale, Montrose, Trail, Warfield, Grand Forks, and Greenwood. Please note that residents of Midway and Rossland should refer to their own local programs, as their rebate structures differ from RDKB's.

The RDKB encourages all eligible homeowners to take advantage of this opportunity to reduce wildfire risks on their properties. As funding is limited and rebates are awarded on a first-come, first-served basis, early application is recommended.

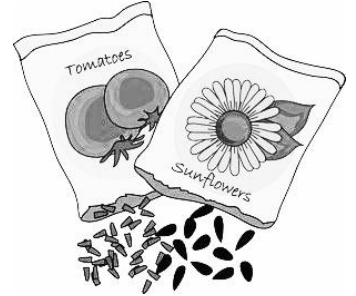

Greenwood/ Phoenix Tramway Bore and Hartford Junction

In 1908, Richard Armstrong (representing a number of Chicago capitalists) proposed to build a 9 by 9 ft. tunnel from Greenwood to the Granby Mines at Phoenix. The first 3000 ft of the tunnel would cut through seven veins and the next 3000 ft. would cut through eleven more veins. A couple of months later, the Greenwood Phoenix Tunnel Company was established with a capitalization of \$5,000, 000.

May 1908 saw the start of the tunnel, and within a week, the company advanced 100 ft. into the mountain. By February of 1910 the tunnel was only 400 ft. long (there must have been some problems). In March of 1911 the tunnel had advanced to 1460 feet and 24 men were employed. But thus far no ore had been struck. Finally, at the 1800-foot level, some ore was struck. In September of 1915, the Chicago Company had a meeting about the tunnel and, as a result, the tunnel was abandoned. Records do not indicate how much ore came from the tunnel, or why they quit, but evidence points to high costs and low returns.

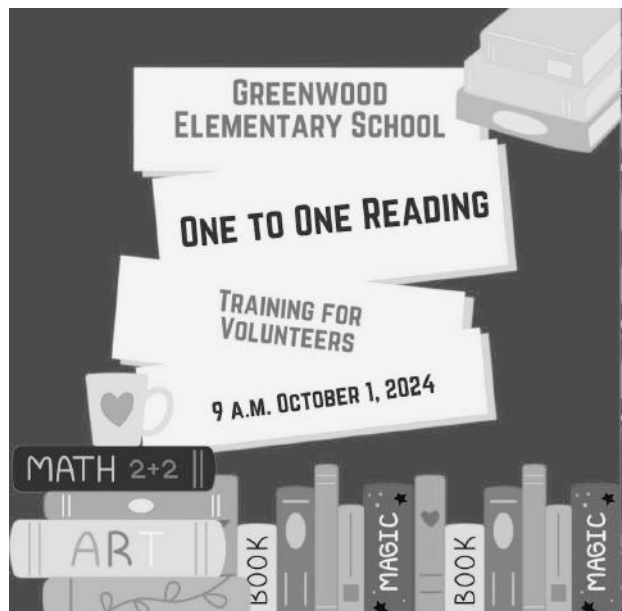
Hartford Junction

From Eholt, the CPR ran a line to Denoro Junction (Emma Mine) through the Athelston Junction and onto Hartford Junction. From the Hartford Junction a spur line continued to the Winnipeg Mine, while the main line switched back and climbed back to Phoenix. Another spur line also ran to the Golden Crown Mine. Later, the switch back was replaced with a loop back to Phoenix. The line was completed to Phoenix in May of 1900. Hartford was named after the Hartford Mines in the area. John Rogers and H.J. Jones owned the Hartford, Hartford Fraction, Ranger, and the J. and R. Fraction.

In August of 1899, John Dorsey moved from Gladstone to Hartford Junction and built the Hartford Hotel. In September of 1900, he sold the hotel to William Buker, a former owner of a boarding house at the BC Mine. Mr. Buker then built another hotel and called it the Clifton. In 1902, Buker sold the Hartford Hotel to Joseph Bassett who had some claims in the area. Then in 1903, the former owner of the Union Hotel in Phoenix bought the Clifton Hotel and, within a year, it closed down. The Hartford Hotel burnt down in 1914, and Bassett continued to work claims in the area.

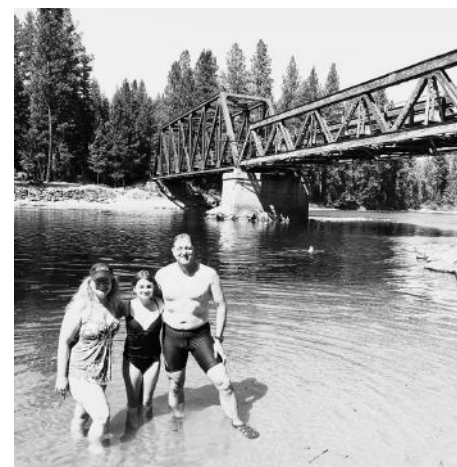
HAVE YOU SEEN THIS RING?

RUMPELSTILTSKEIN FIBRE ARTS GUILD

In 1981 a group of ladies interested in spinning, weaving and felting got together to learn and enjoy working together. During the next year they worked out a constitution and became a non-profit society called the Rumplestiltskein Wheel and Loom Guild, offering various workshops at the schools; also participating at the Rock Creek Fall Fair as an educational exhibit.

Over the next few years, 4 of the ladies moved away and as the numbers of the original group dwindled the focus changed to quilting. In 2002 we officially changed our name to what it is today. We have held our meetings at various locations over the years, and are currently meeting at either the Rock Creek Medical Centre or the Kettle Wildlife Hall.

Our members are very willing to try new crafts and types of handwork as well as the quilting projects and group challenges that we participate in. We contribute to our community by donations of quilts to those who are dealing with serious illness, and those who have suffered losses through fire or flood. Parkview Manor has received placemats, slippers and Christmas stockings over the years and more recently, face masks. During covid the guild supplied hundreds of free masks for our local community, dispensed through the Riverside Centre.

We are currently partnered with the Mennonite Restoration Committee providing quilts to those in the broader community who are able to return to their homes after losses.

Community Works (Gas Tax) Applications

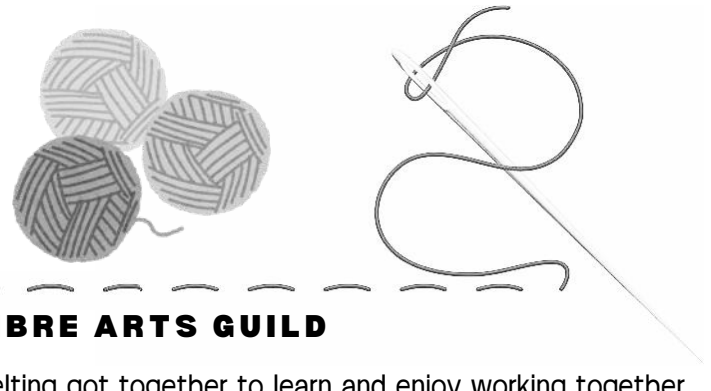

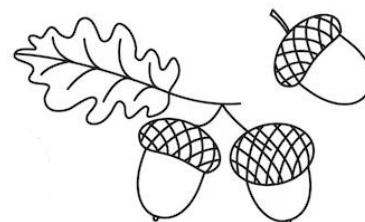

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PUBLIC NOTICE BEAVERDELL FUEL MANAGEMENT PROJECT

The Crown Land Wildfire Risk Reduction Program (WRR), administered through the Ministry of Forests (MOF), has identified the Community of Beaverdell as a community at high risk to threat of wildfire.

The MOF is responsible for implementing fuel treatments on crown land adjacent to communities to reduce the risk of wildfire threat to communities.

What happened in 2020?

- In 2020 WRR identified the Community of Beaverdell as a high priority area to implement a fuel treatment. A wildland urban interface wildfire risk reduction plan was developed to identify priority areas for treatment.

What happened in 2021?

- In spring 2021, the MOF awarded a contract for fuel management prescriptions to be developed for treatment units in Beaverdell. A final fuel management prescription was completed by March 31, 2022.

What happened in 2022?

- In 2022 Vaagen completed harvest operations in four treatment units.

What's planned for 2024?

- Implementation of the WRR treatments, as identified in the fuel modification prescriptions. The Contractor will be starting in the red outlined units.
- The MOF has also awarded a contract to Boundary Invasive Species Society (BISS) for the management of invasive plants in the treatment units. This is a three-year contract, and local residents will see BISS workers in the area.

What's planned for 2025?

- The MOF plans to award a contract for further fuel management work in the yellow outlined areas.
- BISS will continue their invasive species management work in the treatment units.
- The MOF is planning a prescribed burn in the orange outlined area to further reduce the surface fuel loading and reduce the risk of wildfire threat. This is in the planning stage and more information will be provided to the community once more concrete plans are developed.

What is planned beyond 2026?

- The MOF, WRR Program plans to maintain these treatment areas in perpetuity. The Ministry will be monitoring the project area and, depending on vegetation response post-treatment, will be conducting maintenance treatments as needed. Maintenance treatments could include, but are not limited to, prescribed burning and/or brushing/thinning of coniferous regen.
